#### INTRODUCTION

Our programmes offer young people the chance to disconnect from technology and reengage meaningfully with themselves, their peers and with communities. They engage in activities which enhance their skills and experiences to positively shape their future, and crucially engages them in development solutions which nurture them as societyserving active citizens.

Our work alongside partner communities drives real, sustainable change in the countries where we operate, creating positive lasting impact for people and our natural world.

2024 marked our 40th year since Operation Raleigh began in 1984. In this milestone year, we are proud to have continued our legacy of standing for youth leadership and creating sustainable impact, as we have done since our inception. We remain wholly committed to this and the Raleigh spirit which lives through our global community.

# **OUR VENTURERS** IN 2024

Raleigh International works with young people aged 17-24 who join as Venturers on the Raleigh Expedition programme. Venturers come to Raleigh with a range of different backgrounds, life stages and motivations.

**IN 2024, RALEIGH INTERNATIONAL WELCOMED:** 








Of our Venturers who joined a Raleigh Expedition in 2024, a significant number were in a post-school and pre-university life stage, joining a Raleigh Expedition as part of their gap year.

Many of our Venturers reported being motivated to join a Raleigh Expedition to help them stand out from the crowd and enhance their future career or study prospects.



#### **VENTURERS FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD**

As an international programme we attract young participants from across the globe, as well as young people from our Expedition countries. Of our 2024 Venturers:

49% were from the UK, 12% from South Africa, 10% from The Netherlands, 7% from Costa Rica.

22% were from other countries. including: USA, Belgium, Australia, Canada, Hong Kong, Germany, Malaysia, Switzerland, Poland, France, Italy and Nicaragua.

#### OUR VENTURERS: SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

The Raleigh Expedition Programme is designed with leadership theory and skills development at its heart. Through the programme structure and activity opportunities we provide, Venturers engage in experiential learning that supports skills-building and professional development.

On Expedition, Raleigh Venturers live and work in remote and complex environments which are different from their norm. From interacting with local communities and partner organisations during their projects, to negotiating complicated landscapes on an adventure challenge, Venturers are exposed to new experiences which drives essential learning.

100% of our Venturers in 2024 reported that they felt they had improved in at least four or more of the following competencies through their Expedition:

Leadership; communication; teamwork; problem-solving; motivating; decision-making; adopting a healthier lifestyle; listening; self-awareness; diplomacy; and organising.

Venturers join a Raleigh Expedition during a pivotal life stage in which they are entering or progressing through young adulthood, when selfconfidence, identity and a sense of purpose is built. The programme nurtures the personal development of Venturers so they are happier, more resilient and fulfilled.

On Expedition our Venturers receive 24/7 support from our country teams to ensure that they gain a sense of personal achievement and enjoyment from completing their Expedition.

#### **OUR VENTURERS:** WELLBEING DEVELOPMENT

With issues around youth mental health on the rise, Raleigh Expedition strives to provide an environment for our Venturers to positively nurture their mental health and well-being, as well as learn tools in resilience against modern challenges. This is why Raleigh Expedition is a phone and alcoholfree programme.

Our digital detox approach strongly supports and enables Venturers to forgo their mobile phones for up to 19-days at a time, with phone access permitted for short 3-day intervals during Phase Changeovers. This encourages Venturers to engage fully in the Expedition with complete presence of mind, prioritising healthy habits and appreciating the benefits of screen-free time.

#### SES RALEIGH EXPLORER AWARD

In 2024, seven young people from lower socio-economic backgrounds were supported to join a Raleigh Expedition through unique bursary funding, provided in partnership with the Scientific Exploration Society and the Raleigh Alumni community.

The SES Raleigh Explorer Award provided fullyfunded places on a Raleigh Expedition in South Africa and Costa Rica to young people who met a number of set criterias, most significantly including:

- Being from a home with an annual mean household income of less than £42,000.
- Showing a commitment to personal and professional growth through a Raleigh Expedition.

The SES Raleigh Explorer Award not only provides funding to accomodate a 10-week Expedition, but also covers flights and travelrelated expenses for Award Recipients.



The SES Explorer Award will fund 18 young people in total to join Expedition from 2024-26 The seven young recipients of the SES Raleigh Explorer Award in 2024 came from a range of backgrounds. They included: careleavers, young care-givers, community volunteers and young expats.

Each Award Recipient demonstrated substantial passion to learn and develop personally through a Raleigh Expedition, and were thoroughly assessed to determine that a Raleigh Expedition programme would not have been attainable for them without bursary support.

In November 2024, Award Recipients were celebrated at the SES Explorer Awards Ceremony, attended by Raleigh Founder John Blashford-Snell, where they were congratulated for their achievements.

I struggle with my mental health, but being out here, I haven't thought about any of that. I've been lighter from depression, anxiety, worry. I feel like I'm free again.


## OUR VENTURER MANAGERS IN 2024

# SOUTH AFRICA: COMMUNITY PROJECTS (Inational

In 2024 the Raleigh South Africa community project took place in the community of Seville B, based just outside the border of Kruger National Park in Mpumalanga District. Here sustained underdevelopment and unemployment pose key challenges for local people.

In the second year of partnership, Raleigh International worked with project partner Nourish to deliver support to the Seville B community. Through outreach projects and the creation of an Eco Village, our work aims to sustainably increase resilience and reduce poverty.

Over three Expedition Cycles, 119 Venturers have collectively spent over 550 project hours in Seville B, supporting the construction of educational facilities, vegetable gardens as well as working and engaging with local students at the Nourish Eco Village.

# SOUTH AFRIC COMMUNITY PROJECTS

Raleigh Venturers also supported the Green Kidz Club, an after school club in the local community. Local school children attend the club where they receive a meal. Venturers engaged the club by providing educational support, including with literacy, sports, arts and crafts and environmental education.

Venturers also conducted work maintaining and decorating the Green Kidz classroom and library, as well as supporting with cooking, serving meals and running lessons.

The people of Seville B are full of love. Raleigh's first project with Nourish was the building of a new playground. The reason we needed the playground was because the local schools close their gates at 2 or 3pm, leaving children nowhere to play. We made this first playground as somewhere for the students to go and play.

The Venturers then helped build the vegetable gardens. These help the grannies to harvest foods to cook for the kids. Sometimes the kids take the harvested foods home to share with their families.

# SOUTH AFRICA: ENVIRONMENT PROJECTS

Raleigh South Africa Environment Projects took place across two different sites in the Mpumpalanga District; The Sawong Reserve and at the Cape Vulture Conservancy.

Across both sites, poor land management practices have resulted in the limited natural migration of wildlife, resulting in widespread habitat degradation. Human-caused obstructions, such as fencing and snares, negatively impact wildlife, while uncontrolled vegetation threatens the growth of biodiversity. Through their projects, Venturers engaged in numerous activities to support ecosystem restoration in the region.

#### **SAWONG RESERVE**

Covering an area of around 1300 hectares, Sawong is home to Big Five wildlife and is privately owned by the South African Defence Force. Raleigh is providing on the ground support to restore the ecosystem back to health.

#### **CAPE VULTURE CONSERVANCY**

The Cape Vulture Conservancy hosts the third largest colony of breeding Cape Vultures and a plethora of wildlife. Due to cattle farming, land within the Conservancy has degraded significantly, while excessive poaching and poor migration access has led to a decline of natural wildlife populations.

#### Raleigh Venturers in 2024 supported a number of conservation activities:

2,114 METRES OF FIRE BREAK

Creating barriers in vegetation to provide natural protection against the spread of bushfires.

#### 425 METRES

OF EROSION CONTROL

Creation of a physical barrier which protects local landscapes from the effects of soil erosion. 6,763 METRES

OF ROAD CLEARING

By removing road obstructions, access for rangers is improved to aid monitoring and anti poaching efforts.

#### **42,853** sq metres

BUSH CLEARING & ENCROACHMENT

The clearing of obstructive vegetation and bush which pose risks to local native vegetation.

# SOUTH AFRICA: ENVIRONMENT PROJECTS



We did many different jobs that contributed to conservation. We removed old fences, telephone wires and collected litter. Removing invasive plants was hard work but interesting. I learned more about the importance of removing certain species. We also gathered data on endangered trees. Seeing how much work we had done during our time was rewarding, as collecting all this research and our work will protect and preserve the environment.

I developed a much better understanding of biodiversity and nature. It made me realise the huge impact humans have on the environment and how our protection and care make a difference, whether big or small. Invasive plant species negatively impact the structural diversity of local ecosystems in Kruger, affecting habitats, population and genetic structure. Tackling invasive plants permits native flora to prosper.

Meanwhile there was an increase in snares in Kruger from 2022-23, with high rates of wildlife injuries due to snaring and poachers causing concern among environmentalists.

#### COSTA RICA: COMMUNITY PROJECTS

In 2024 the Raleigh Costa Rica community projects took place in two regions; the Alto Chirrpo Indigenous Territory and the Talamanca Bribri Indigenous Territory. Across the two regions, Raleigh Venturers spent over 1000 hours on project activities benefitting 9 schools.

In these indigenous territories, significant educational and infrastructural challenges threaten access to education for young people growing up in these regions. Through our community projects in Costa Rica, Venturers conduct construction activities aiming to build and improve educational facilities and public services.

Improvements in school infrastructure through these projects indirectly benefit hundreds of students by creating more space for personalised classes and expanding the school's capacity to accommodate larger groups. With better facilities, schools can hire additional teachers, offer more subjects and improve the quality of education. Crucially, these upgrades lead to increased investment from the Ministry of Education in teaching materials, equipment, and resources, further enriching the learning environment for all students.

#### COSTA RICA: COMMUNITY PROJECTS

Wooden hallways with corrugated laminate roofs provide sheltered spaces that protect students from rains during the winter season, ensuring they stay dry and healthy.

17 ACTION DAYS DELIVERED



On top of crucial physical construction activites, Venturers ran 17 action days in our project communities. These action days engaged local people in activities and discussions centered on health, hygiene, and sustainability. Topics such as the importance of handwashing, maintaining clean bathrooms and recycling are highlighted, encouraging collective responsibility for a healthier environment.

#### COSTA RICA: ENVIRONMENT PROJECTS

In 2024 the Raleigh Costa Rica environmental projects took place in three areas; La Amistad Caribe Conservation Area, Corcovado National Park and in the Conservation Area of Guanacaste. Here Raleigh Venturers spent over 1,100 hours on environmental project activities supporting nature and biodiversity conservation.

With over 5% of the world's biodiversity, Costa Rica is environmentally rich but also has areas which are biologically vulnerable. Raleigh Venturers have conducted vital project work to support local organisations and park rangers who are leading conservation efforts.

In addition to physical conservation activities, Raleigh Venturers engaged in 65 environmental sessions, in which they participated in activities learning about environmental processes and biodiversity. These talks are key for raising awareness about the importance of conservation efforts.

#### ALUMNI ENGAGEMENT IN 2024

Since 1984, over 57,000 young people have joined a Raleigh International programme in over 50 countries around the world, making up our global Alumni community. In 2024 we continued to engage with our network as an active part of our mission.

EVELOP NEW

#### **Our Raleigh Reconnect Campaign**

In October 2024, Raleigh International launched a wide-spread alumni engagement campaign to mark our 40th anniversary. 'Raleigh Reconnect' was launched with the goal to grow our digital Alumni network of previous Raleigh Venturers, so we could better engage and nurture our global community.

As part of this campaign, we collated a list detailing over 600 programmes from Raleigh's history, providing Alumni the opportunity to identify and select their Expedition. This not only supports Raleigh to reconnect with our Alumni, but also helps us to reconnect Alumni with other each other and facilitate reunions.

As part of this campaign, we launched a celebratory '40 Years of Raleigh' video to share our thanks to our Alumni community who have helped make Raleigh what it is today.

As part of Raleigh Reconnect, we welcomed over 450 Alumni back into our digital network. The campaign is on going and will continue through 2025.

#### **Alumni Engagement**

We carried out a number of initatives which involved Alumni in 2024.

We worked with over 30 alumni on outreach activities, including their participation in online and in-person events and career fairs, as well as their contributions to digital communications such as blogs, case studies, and social media content.

Alumni engagement has supported awareness raising about Raleigh Expedition, expanding the impact of the Raleigh brand.

#### **Raleigh National Societies**

Raleigh National Societies around the world continued to run independent initiatives promoting active citizenship and community service in 2024. These included in:

#### **Raleigh UK Expedition**

In July 2024, to mark our 40th year Raleigh International launched a special UK Expedition for 13-16 year olds. Taking place in the South West of England, the Expedition took 11 young people on a 11-day programme. Returning to our sailing roots, this involved a 6-day sailing excursion aboard the Prolific and an environmental project - set up alongside project partner Till The Coast Is Clear - focused on the conservation of Britain's beaches and coastline.

Through the Expedition the young participants took part in fun basic survival activities, learning skills in resilience, confidence and team-building along the way.



#### **Raleigh's Founder visits projects**

In October 2024, Operation Raleigh Founder John Blashford-Snell visited our Costa Rica Expedition. It was wonderful to introduce him to our Venturers and celebrate their Expedition achievements, especially in our 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary year.



#### Raleigh re-launches Borneo Expedition

In August 2024 we announced the opening of applications for our new Raleigh Borneo Expedition. The new Expedition represents a return to Borneo seven years after we closed operations there in 2017 after 30 years. The first Borneo Expedition began in January 2025.
